ORDER GRANTING MOTION FOR *IN CAMERA* REVIEW

Before the Court is the apparently-unopposed¹ Motion for *In Camera* Review filed by the City of Memphis (the “City”) on July 2, 2018. (ECF No. 86.) In order to establish the existence of the law enforcement investigative privilege as it relates to certain documents the City argues should remain sealed in this action, the City seeks permission to submit, for *in camera* review, the affidavits of Sergeant Timothy Reynolds and Colonel Paul Wright of the Memphis Police Department.

¹ “Counsel for ACLU-TN did not object to the City seeking permission to request *in camera* review of the Affidavits, but reserves the right to object at a later time.” (ECF No. 86 at PageID 1639.)

Having reviewed the instant Motion and the documents as to which the City asserts the law enforcement privilege, the Court finds that the City has presented sufficient evidence that the privilege may exist and be properly asserted with respect to certain documents in this case. Accordingly, the City's Motion for *In Camera* Review is GRANTED. The City shall submit the affidavits of Sergeant Timothy Reynolds and Colonel Paul Wright for *in camera* review by no later than **July 16, 2018**.
